The American papers are manifesting a suspicious interest in the return of Sir Wilfrid Laurier and his government to power. It is interesting to read the comments on the result of the elections, as they appear in several of these journals. The future of Portland is now assured—of course at the expense of Canadian taxpayers. A special despatch from Portland to the Boston American says—"Every body is as man in P. land feels like celebrating for a boom that will rival any western mining camp boom in its palmy days. Predictions are made that the population of Portland will be doubled in a few years from the time the Grand Trunk railway, from Winnipeg to the Pacific Coast is completed. The building of the extension of the road was assured by the result of the Canadian elections when the Liberals won over the Conservatives." After this our American cousins can no longer complain of unfriendliness on the part of Canadians. The very fact that refusal to prosecute offenders under the alien laws was one instance of our country's love, and now we go further to prove our undying devotion for the "land of the free" by throwing \$150,000,000 away on a railway to benefit Portland.
